



## Study Area





## New Regionalism

- Addressing challenges through new governance
- Regionalization (Hall & Stern 2009) the process of becoming a new region
- Characteristics identity and distinctiveness







#### Reluctant Rural Regionalists

(Hall & Stern 2009)

- Resistance based on uneven distribution of results of regionalization
- Factors that work against regionalization
  - Institutional funding arrangements
  - Cultural Identity
  - Markets
  - Public Service provision



#### Method



- 85 interviews
- Federal/Provincial agencies responsible for tourism (n=11)
- Local government (n=9)
- Businesses (n=33)
- Community members (n=32)

## Analysis ... 1

- Definition of Region
  - Gov/Loc Gov = political boundary
  - Com/Bus = connection to spaces, people
- Linkages between communities in region
  - EDOs, social/family, travel corridors (ish)
- Advantages of working together
  - Gov/Loc Gov/Bus = tourism brand, market, product
  - Loc Gov = greater political voice



## Analysis ... 2



- Challenges
  - Gov/Bus = distance, lack of product, competition, urban-rural divide
  - Loc Gov = resistance
- Required to make regional tourism work
  - All = coordinator; tourism ready
- Resource-based History
  - Limited tourism development capacity (Schmallegger & Carson, 2010; Carson & Carson, 2011)

- Institutional funding arrangements
  - "continued practice of distinction"
- Cultural Identity
  - resource-based identity (Staples carson & Carson 2011)
- Markets
  - Competition for visitors
- Public Service Provision
  - Resource issues
